A MISSION FOR LIFE

St. Jeanne Jugan founded the Little Sisters of the Poor in a very simple, yet dramatic way. One winter evening in 1839 in St. Servan, France, she opened her heart and her home to an elderly, blind, paralyzed woman, Anne Chauvin. She brought her to her apartment and placed Anne in her own bed. Soon another old woman followed, then a third. The Congregation of the Little Sisters of the Poor, with its unique mission of hospitality to the elderly, poor was born.


Due to the great poverty in France in the years following the French Revolution, Jeanne's bold gesture of charity toward the elderly poor answered a pressing need. Her small apartment soon became too small to accommodate the growing number of elderly who were seeking hospitality. Several young women came to assist Jeanne to care for the elderly, and the group moved from one building to another until they could obtain a suitable home.

Jeanne and these young women formed a small community and began begging to support the large family. The community named themselves, "Servants of the Poor". In 1844, their name was changed to "Sisters of the Poor". Five years later, because many people called them "Little Sisters of the Poor," the community finally adopted that name.

Jeanne's deep faith and loving heart motivated her to give up her own bed and devote her whole life to the service of the elderly poor. Jeanne took to heart the words of Jesus, "Whatever you do to the least of my brethren, you do to me." She would often say, "Never forget that the poor are Our Lord. It is Jesus whom you care for in them." Such faith and loving hearts and the charism of begging, are present today in the Little Sisters of the Poor at Queen of Peace Residence. This year, we celebrate the 150th anniversary of the arrival of the Little Sisters to America.

The Little Sisters devoutly value the reverence for life. This is ever-present in the humble service they provide to the elderly poor at Queen of Peace Residence. Life just doesn't continue at our home, it thrives through the presence of a genuine family spirit. This, of course, is the hallmark of the Little

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CELEBRATING LIFE

THE 150TH ANNIVERSARY MASS CELEBRATION

April 9th marked a very special day for the Little Sisters of the Poor. At 2 pm, a special Mass of Thanksgiving was celebrated at St. Nicholas of Tolentine Church in Jamaica, NY to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the arrival of the Little Sisters in America. The principal celebrant of the Mass was Bishop Nicholas DiMarzio, the Bishop of the Diocese of Brooklyn. This was most fitting in that it was the very first Bishop of Brooklyn, Bishop John Loughlin, who welcomed the Little Sisters to America in 1868. The Mass was concelebrated by six auxiliary bishops from the diocese of Brooklyn and the diocese of Rockville Centre. Presiding at the Mass were forty-five clergy and several seminarians and deacons. The entrance procession into the church was led by members of the Knights of Columbus and of the Order of Malta. The Mass was attended by Little Sisters, Residents and guests from all of the homes in our province, as well as numerous other religious communities from the greater New York City area. In addition, Mother Provincial Alice Marie Monica of the Brooklyn province, Mother Provincial Marie Christine Joseph of Chicago and Mother Provincial Lorraine Marie Clare of Baltimore were also in attendance

Assisting our numerous guests throughout the day were students from Kellenberg Memorial High School. Their ever-present smiles and positive and respectful demeanor added a special blessing to the day.

In his homily, Bishop DiMarzio spoke fondly of the mission of the Little Sisters in their care for the elderly poor with dignity and respect, and by extension, their embrace of life at all stages. The Bishop reminded those present that in such care, the Little Sisters are serving Christ in the presence of those served. Our own Mother Provincial, Alice Marie Monica, read a letter to the Congregation from the Little Sisters' superior general, Mother María del Monte Auxiliadora.

After Mass there was a delightful and well-attended reception held in the parish Hall of St. Nicholas of Tolentine. It was a wonderful time to gather, share fellowship and celebrate a landmark in the storied history of the Little Sisters. We want to especially thank all those dear friends of ours who volunteered to plan, support and execute this special day for us. It was a great deal of work and we are most grateful to all of you. My dear Sisters, you act as both sister and mother to those whom you serve. I am sure you have heard some of the elderly at the point of death, calling for their mothers. They are children returning to God, calling their earthly mothers and Mary, their heavenly Mother, at the hour of death. You are there in multiple capacities for them, the sick and the dying.

You, my dear Sisters, are also handmaids of the Lord. With your hands, hearts and souls you do God's will in caring lovingly for others. You become like Mary who, after the Annunciation hastened to Elizabeth who, in her old age, has conceived John the Baptist. Mary gives the correct example at the very beginning of the work of redemption, that the care for our elders is part of the continued work of redemption.

Mary's motherhood preceded by her attribute as the "handmaiden of the Lord," gives her the task of Mediatrix which the Church assigns to her, "pray for us sinners now and at the hour of our death." You assist the dying at the hour of their death. Your mediation is an imitation of the love of the Mother of God for us all.

The Eucharist we celebrate today commemorates the anniversary of your Sister ancestors' first coming to America.

Our Communion today would not have been possible without Mary's "Yes" to the Lord, and the work of the Little Sisters of the Poor would not be possible without your "Yes" to your vocation of service to the elderly.

Today, I know that these words of praise and gratitude echo in the heart of each of the Little Sisters serving here in the Brooklyn diocese at Queen of Peace Residence and all the Little Sisters in these United States.

And they surely must have echoed in the hearts of the first seven Little Sisters of the Poor, who set foot on American soil in New York on September 13, 1868 after two weeks crossing the Atlantic Ocean from France. Three days later they opened their first Home on DeKalb Avenue in Brooklyn and then, on September 20th, welcomed the first elderly Resident....

Today, 150 years later, this assembly is a beautiful reflection of the Family Spirit that our Mother Foundress, envisioned: A family of Little Sisters and Residents, Associates, Clergy, Religious, Friends, Benefactors, Volunteers, Staff, students and young people and so many others.

As a final word, I would ask everyone to please continue to pray for and encourage young people to consider a vocation to the priesthood and religious life – that they may respond generously to the Lord of the Harvest if they are being called.



LIFETIME DEVOTION



St. Joseph, Protect Those Who Turn To You With Confidence. Amen.

St. Jeanne Jugan had a special devotion to St. Joseph, head of the Holy Family and its provider, to obtain all she needed to care for the elderly poor. She considered him to be the great Protector and Provider of the Little Sisters of the Poor.

In his book, *Humble So As To Love More*, Paul Milcent provides a descriptive account of her devotion as follows: "...Jeanne saw the old people eating dry bread. 'But this is the land of butter!' she exclaimed. 'Why on earth don't you ask St. Joseph for some?' She lit a night-light in front of St. Joseph's statue, and had all the empty butter-dishes fetched and propped up a card: 'Good St. Joseph, send us butter for our old folk!' Visitors were amazed or amused at such simplicity of heart; one of them expressed misgivings at the sight of the empty butter-dishes! But a few days later, an anonymous donor sent a very large amount of butter, and all the dishes were filled."

Today the Little Sisters continue to confide their needs to St. Joseph, seeing in him a father in the likeness of our heavenly Father, whose Providence watches especially over little ones. This year, the feast of St. Joseph was celebrated by a special Mass at Queen of Peace with

Bishop Paul R. Sanchez of the diocese of Brooklyn was the principal celebrant. After Mass, our guests and Residents enjoyed a special lunch along with the traditional St. Joseph's table.

REMEMBERING MSGR. RODGERS A LIFETIME IN GOD'S SERVICE

Msgr. William J. Rodgers, the first black man ordained for and in the diocese of Brooklyn, passed into eternal life on January 21st at Queen of Peace Residence. Msgr. Rodgers had been living at our Residence for many years and before retiring, had served as our chaplain since 1987. Msgr. Rodgers was 95 years old. He was ordained on June 11, 1949 by Bishop Thomas A. Molloy.

Auxiliary Bishop Raymond Chappetto was the principal celebrant at the funeral Mass held in the chapel at our Residence. Msgr. Joseph Nugent, who concelebrated the Mass, delivered the homily. He remembered Msgr. Rodgers as "a humble man who loved the Church and loved God. He was always ready to help those who needed it"

We remember Msgr. Rodgers as he attended daily Mass. He always had a smile and kind word for everyone. He enjoyed meeting people
