Still Safe At Home

These past six months have been unprecedented. As we continue to deal with the Coronavirus pandemic, we wanted to share with you that our Residents remain safe at home and continue to be cared for as our mission dictates. As you can imagine, this has not been an easy undertaking. Our ability to still be "Safe at Home" is the result of our consistently receiving the prayers and support of so many of you.

We credit the early lock down of our Home in March with establishing a safe environment. In addition, the early implementation of the extensive preventive measures taken at Queen of Peace have shown to provide the protection our Residents so richly deserve. Such measures have included the initiation of our emergency management system, eliminating all visitation to our Home, restricting access to our Home in the delivery of supplies, and individual health screening of our Sisters and dedicated Staff through our more secure and medically-staffed lobby.

To remain in compliance with the various New York State mandates and the regulations of the New York State Department of Health, we continually update our procedures and protocols. Our procedures are all fully documented on a daily basis as per these regulations.

We have received, and continue to secure, supplies of personal protective equipment (PPE) and alcohol-based hand-sanitizing gel which have been used extensively as we consciously do what is needed to prevent the spread of infection. As you can imagine, our hand-sanitizer stations throughout the Residence are used at length.

Many thanks to our food service provider, Unidine Corporation, for maintaining our full dining menu for our Residents and implementing the individual service of meals to our Residents in the privacy of their own rooms. As we highlighted in our blog posts over the last six months, the laundry continues to be done and our Residence remains on our own vigilant cleaning and housekeeping schedules every day. In addition, we have implemented strategic environmental cleaning of our entire Residence on a regularly-scheduled basis.

Our Residents continue to receive the medical care and medicine they need from our dedicated nursing staff. They are actively assessed



by the devoted nursing staff twice daily to be sure to catch any signs of illness in the earliest stages.

We are becoming experts in "social distancing" and adapting our Residents' daily activities to allow for proper spacing. Bingo in the hallways is a new way of playing a classic game!

Fr. Evans selflessly continues to provide for the spiritual needs of our Residents. Daily Mass, via closed-circuit TV, continues.

The stockpile of emergency supplies continues to grow with large purchases of food, canned goods, water, paper products and cleaning supplies. This has been supplemented by the most generous inkind donations received from many individuals and organizations including; the Knights of Columbus, the Columbiettes, and the Order of Malta.

Our spirit remains strong and our trust in God's Providence and Protection has never wavered. We continue to pray for the safety and good health of all of you and ask that a cure for this virus may be found quickly.

Thank you for your continued prayers and support. These are trying times but together, we will get through this difficulty because we are not only partners in a Mission, but family members sticking together.

A Papal Honor

In March, Mother Celine Thérèse was informed by Bishop Nicholas DiMarzio, Bishop of Brooklyn, that Pope Francis would confer Papal Honors on our dear Mother Celine. In recognition of Mother's longstanding dedicated service to the people of God, and for her selfless service to the Church while in the diocese of Brooklyn, Pope Francis has conferred on her the Benemerenti Medal.

The Benemerenti Medal is an honor awarded by the Pope to members of the clergy and laity for service to the Catholic Church.

The current version of the Benemerenti Medal was designed by Pope Paul VI. The Medal is a gold Greek cross depicting Christ with His hand raised in blessing. On the left arm of the cross is the tiara and crossed keys symbol of the Papacy. On the right arm is the coat of arms of the current Pope. The Medal is suspended from a yellow and white ribbon, the colors of the Papacy.

It took a little convincing for Mother Celine to agree to accept the award, which she insists she accepted on behalf of all the Little Sisters of the Poor.
