Being Tested

"When your patience and strength run out and you feel alone and helpless, Jesus is waiting for you in the chapel. Say to Him, 'Jesus, you know exactly what is going on. You are all I have, and you know all things. Come to my help.' And then go, and don't worry about how you are going to manage. That you have told God about it is enough. He has a good memory."

Many of you took St. Jeanne Jugan's guidance to heart and, while you couldn't necessarily go to church to pray, you took the time and made the effort to talk with Jesus and ask for His help. The tests we faced and continue to face are numerous. However, having our faith to turn to and lean on in these times, insures that no matter the test, no matter the time involved, no matter the personal hardship incurred, our faith will see us through.

MOTHER'S MESSAGE


